Parker Palmer is a Quaker/Friends religious educator and scholar as well as a man of thought, compassion and commitment. He led UU ministers and religious educators some years ago for several days and I came to profoundly appreciate his work and his manner. What he is speaking of in this particular quote is one that has meaning in every context, individual and community. It certainly speaks to the UU Church of Olinda's place in the world in this moment, as we enter into the second decade of this century in this new millennium. In Spring Linda Thomson will come (hopefully no respiratory problems this time!), to lead the board into the congregation's future (and they, in turn, to lead the congregation) by listening deeply to the words of the church's Mission Statement and hear what it has to tell the congregation about what it is called to do. I know I have said such things before; it is time to act fully, coherently, beautifully, in a pattern knitted out of who the people are and the words the congregation has chosen.

The beauty of the winter is not so much the snowfall on every kind of winter-remaining flower, nor the ice glittering in moonlight. The beauty of winter is in the barrenness of trees and bushes that outlines and displays their skeletal truths. Whether any of us have made new year promises or not, let us promise, at least, to watch these trees and bushes without their leaves, holding the truths of Olinda and your place in it in mind and heart.



Application for Lay Chaplain

It is standard practice for Unitarian-Universalist churches to have at least one lay chaplains on call for those milestone occasions that come up when the Minister is not available. When we dedicated Evelyn Pigott as our current Lay Chaplain, we also decided that some time half way through her tenure the church would seek a second Lay Chaplain so that we would sometimes have two (a good thing)and also have an overlap of chaplain tenures. Since the training is offered in the Spring, applications for this position need to be submitted by Feb. 15. Please see Christine for an application form and return it to her or to another member of the committee: John Haynes or Bobbye Baylis.

After approval by the Lay Chaplaincy Committee, the Board and the Congregation, then following the Lay Chaplaincy training, the Lay Chaplain will be able to perform Child Dedications, Weddings, and Memorial Services. Anyone wishing more information about this role should speak with the Minister or with Sheron Campbell or Evelyn Pigott.

Thank you to everyone who attended the Congregational Budget Meeting on Dec. 6 and supported the Budget that had been approved by the Finance Committee and subsequently by the Board of Trustees. It was a good meeting, with good questions asked, and hopefully clear answers given. There will be a meeting of the Finance Meeting in January or February with the Lloyd Fund Committee to decide whether there should be any change in the manner in which dispersements from the Lloyd Fund are determined. Anyone who would like input into this discussion will be welcome at that meeting. Naturally, the other option is to pass your comments along to a member of one of these committees.

Since the deficit projected for 2010 is large enough for concern, there will also be a meeting of the Finance Committee to discuss fundraising opportunities. Again, everyone's input is needed to provide a wide range of possibilities.
