There will be celebration among the community, and the Sunday following the mid-week anniversary, the Executive Director of the Canadian Unitarian Council, Jennifer Dickson will visit us and talk about the work of the staff of the CUC (all the congregations of the council including Olinda!). The summer of 2010 reminded us of the extraordinary breadth of possible by way of change. Sunday Services Committee

Our summer services were relatively well attended this year. The first, on July 25, featured a service led by Gypsy Carroll, in which Evelyn Fisher discussed her moving experiences as a medical doctor treating AIDS patients. The second service, on August 15, we welcomed four members of the Elora-Fergus congregation to a service I gave featuring a talk about the Herschels and their lives of astronomy and music. Although it may have helped that the Sunday services chair from Elora-Fergus, Jim Sannes, and his wife Ellen Papenburg, who is lay chaplain there, are both astronomy buffs and that former Olinders Anne Treadwell and June Gilbertson have given services there, their real reason for visiting was to experience our historic church and prepare for learning more about Universalism from Louise Foulds, who is speaking there this Fall. Seventeen of us had a pleasant supper at King's Landing on Saturday evening before the service. Thanks are due to Ann Siegel-Robertson and Sheron Campbell for pro-



viding billets to our guests. Bobbye and I were pleased to host Jim and Ellen for the evening. Jim attended our Sunday Services meeting and offered some helpful suggestions. Helen Moore reported that twenty-eight people came to the Sunday service, a record for summer attendance! (See an image of many of them, taken after the service.)

The regular church season begins on September 12 with what is called the Water Communion: everyone is invited to bring a glass of water and summer memories to share with the congregation. On Sept. 19, Jane Innerd and Julian Cattaneo are planning take over the pulpit to talk about best-selling author and Professor of Religious Studies Bart Ehrman and some of his interesting books on early Christianity. Central to the discussion, I believe, are his books Misquoting Jesus: The Story Behind Who Changed the Bible and Why, and Lost Christianities: The Battles for Scripture and the Faiths We Never Knew.
