UU Olinda Service on July 22

The theme I would like to discuss at our service on July 22 is "Preparing for the Future". This is a guiding principle for many aspects of our lives, whether we freeze and can fresh fruit and vegetables for consumption in winter months or stash money away for a vacation or for retirement. It is also implicit in some of the first 7 principles of Unitarian-Universalists: respect for the interdependent web of all existence requires preserving it for the future, and the inherent worth and dignity of every person includes leaving a welcome environment to future generations. Yet, the financial driving forces of the world economy often seem to ignore future consequences of current exploitation. Share holders have little allegiance to the companies whose stocks they hold and are all too willing to sacrifice their long-term viability for immediate profit. Greed exemplified by the rush to exploit natural resources at unsustainable rates with no reserves set aside for environmental consequences or sales by following generations, as well as denying the threats of global warming and ignoring the fact that resources of the planet are finite, are forms of mortgaging the future of humanity and the planet for the sake of immediate consumption.

I welcome your contributions to the discussion. Can you come up with other examples? Which are of the greatest concern? Should preparing for the future be the basis for an eighth UU principle?

From the Board

Your Board met twice in June. First, on June 7, we set priorities for capital improvements. These include up to \$400 for a park-type bench for the front porch, and removal and replacement of the tall, broken chimney. Since the church is now heated by natural gas, the flue can be much simpler. Unique Roofing has been asked to do the chimney work, and they will also undertake to finally fix the water leak around the spire. Other priorities include replacing the set of windows at the front of the church on the second floor, and the basement: new East and South walls, new windows, and new flooring. Much of the basement work would be funded by past AUUction sales. Of highest priority is to fix the downstairs bathroom.

Our regular Board meeting was held one week later, on June 14. There we launched the solar-panel project. Work on re-roofing parts of the roof that will be under the panels will wait approximately two months until (and if) we are notified of a contract for grid connection under Ontario's microfit program. There are other capital projects that the Church wants to undertake with funds already collected. This includes a park bench for the front porch and new windows and other repairs to the basement. The Board also reviewed the final proof of the new telephone directory.

Dorothy Brown and her crew are retiring from kitchen duty and the preparation of coffee hour that forms an essential part of any Sunday service. A committee of Mariette Preyde, Leona Crowder, and Carol Hylton will take over the operation of the kitchen, and they will welcome Sunday contributions from the congregation.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled at 7 PM on Thursday, September 20, 2012. All church members are welcome to attend. Committee members will be alert for email-discussion and possibly decisions during the summer months.

Important Notice re future Bake Sale and Ruthven Apple Festival

During this last Yard and Bake Sale, we noticed that most of our success was due to the baked goods and barbecue and much less due to the yard sale. Based on this experience, as a one-year experiment, the Board has decided to devote all our energy to next May's bake/other food items sale and to drop the yard sale. Items like jellies and preserves were mentioned. If anyone is interested in preserving any summer fruits or baking pies involving them, they would be very welcome additions to the Bake Sale. It is nice if we can provide local contents in our sale.

So that being the case, we are giving you a heads up so you can think about it and do something this summer if you would like. If we wait until fall to let you know this, it will be past the time in most cases

The Board also thought that, since there will be such an emphasis on food items during the May Bake Sale, we should not be asking the same folks to be baking and preserving for the Ruthven Apple Festival booth. Hence we decided not to participate in the Ruthven Apple Festival in 2012.
