

From the Hillparson



The life of every congregation has its own unique aspects, and meaningful ways that can be of value to other congregations. True also, is that it is a good idea to be aware of what is unique about a given congregation and what is similar to others.

The following piece is from the weekly newsletter of a D.C.-area organization called The Alban Institute. Designed to teach ministers and congregations it provides assistance in many ways: by the newsletter, by books authored by their consultants and others, consultants who hold workshops , and also, those consultants sometimes go out to congregations or ministerial groups.

The following is a piece by a premier thinker and author in the work of congregations of whatever denomination. He is a remarkable man. Steinke notes Edwin Friedman in the piece. He also left organized religion a tremendous work called “Generation to Generation” that uses family systems theory to talk about congregations.

Where to Touch the Elephant

The well-known story of the elephant and the blind men has several versions. One version goes like this: a group of blind men touch an elephant to learn what it is like. Each one, though, touches a different part of the animal, and, based on that part, infer a larger truth about what the entire elephant must be like. In one account, the elephant is like a wicker basket to the one who touched the ear, a pot to the blind man who touched the head, and a brush to the one who touched the tip of the tail. When they compare their experiences, they discover their disagreement. Each one has his own view of reality, depending upon where he touched the elephant. Someone once said that truth is like an elephant surrounded by blind men.

Picking up on this story, Edwin Friedman states, “I touch the elephant wherever the elephant appears.” His remark is based on the idea that the enormity of the elephant precludes anyone comprehending the whole. One can only observe what is there in front of him or her. In life, Friedman is suggesting, prodigious complexity can be understood only from the perspective of what is at hand. The elephant is too monstrous to handle in its entirety.

Let’s probe the elephant-touch dilemma as it affects the life of today’s church: If we think of the elephant as representing the congregation’s mission, do all touches have the same value? Is there a place we all must touch? Finally, can we touch the mission in different places, disagree, and still work together?

From the Board

The Board held a rather long regular meeting on September 19, then returned for a special session on Sunday evening, September 22. We first had to formally agree to pay for the bit of extra work needed in the basement in order to nicely finish the installation of new windows and interior walls after some mold was discovered on the paneling. More work is needed to seal the exterior walls and ensure proper drainage, and quotations for that work is being sought. We also want to lay down new flooring, but that can probably wait until next spring or summer. Now that the mold has been removed and the carpet fully cleaned, the basement is much improved: brighter, cleaner, with new electrical outlets, and an appearance of more space. We will all be able to enjoy the fresh environment at our first pot-luck dinner, which--after considerable debate--the Board has scheduled after the service on October 6.

Our meeting on Sunday evening was with CUC representative for Eastern Canada, Linda Thomson, in order to initiate a review of the ministry and the minister as called for in the Minister's Letter of Agreement. A first step considers the operation of the Committee on Ministry, which is charged with leading the review and must select, in consultation with the Board, the Minister, and the Congregation, appropriate tools for the assessment. The purpose of the review is to improve the Ministry of the Church, with more open, transparent communication that allows us to more effectively act on the Church's mission. I expect that it will lead to a refinement of our expectations and perhaps modifications in how these are reflected in the Letter of Agreement.

Jaws dropped when Board members viewed a donation cheque from Philip Foulds, Louise Fould's husband. It arrived in the regular mail with a note to our minister. Philip will not be able to attend the memorial service for Louise on October 19 but wanted to convey the donation on behalf of Louise. We are deeply grateful, as the card that many of you signed, expressed.

The Church has a new friend, Vince Spicer, to thank for discovering why our uuolinda.org website has been ignored by Google and other search engines. Imbedded in the source code for the main page was an instruction for search engines to not list it. This was evidently left over from the initial setup of the site, but it should have been removed. Now, thanks to help from Zach Showers, it has been removed, but it may still take some time for the website to be properly listed.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled at 7 PM on Thursday, October 17, 2013. All church members are welcome to attend.


The second event is a film on Harry Belafonte's social activist life. This will take place after Coffee Hour after church on Nov. 17. Mariette will organize sandwiches, supplied
