From the Board

As usual at Board meetings, the first item after opening words, approval of the agenda, and any declarations of conflict of interest, is to approve minutes from the previous meeting. After approval, the minutes are to be posted for all members to read on the wall in the coffee room. These may not deliver gripping reading, but they are an important way—in addition to highlights mentioned in these columns—that the Board uses to clearly communicate its business to the congregation. Please remember, too, that members of the church are always welcome to attend meetings. But if possible, let us know ahead of the meeting if you wish to make a presentation.

At its November meeting, the Board approved the addition of the Louise Foulds bequest to the church's investment fund, known as the Lloyd Fund. Other donations made in honour of Louise are going to the Memorial Fund. To recognize the bequest and Louise's significant influence in the history of our church, the Board voted to name the photo-voltaic cells (PVCs) on our roof the Louise Foulds Solar Panels. Income from the panels, over \$4000 since March this year, will continue to be treated as investment income from the Lloyd Fund.

The Board heard its first report from the newly reconstituted Committee on Ministry (CoM). As Jane Innerd mentioned in her report, at its first meeting with new committee member Steve Brennan, it also welcomed its first visit in years by a congregant, namely Stuart Miller. Stuart, of course, is also our Religious Education Trustee. In addition to issues about RE, Stuart raised concerns and made suggestions involving the operation of the CoM, the evaluation procedure for the Ministry and the Minister, the health of the church, and communication issues. There was not enough time to discuss details, but the CoM will respond to Stuart's issues. At the same time, other members of the congregation are encouraged to ask for a meeting with the committee. You do not need to bring as many issues to the table as Stuart did, but your input is important. Write or talk to any member of the CoM. The CoM is committed to being open and responsive while maintaining confidentiality. An evaluation tool being developed to assess and advance the Ministry of the Church is being refined to facilitate our growth toward a healthy and prosperous future. It should be available by the end of the calendar year.

In support of Leamington and its Heinz workers, Karen Miller is organizing a vigil following the Santa Claus parade on Saturday evening, November 30. While its charitable status deters the Church itself from taking an official stand, many members obviously support the effort. Rev. Christine Hillman and others will participate as concerned individuals, and the Board was happy to have the "Standing on the Side of Love" banner used, as expressing an appropriate message for the vigil. The Social Responsibility Committee is also supporting the effort.

Other items being worked on by the Board include privacy and abuse-prevention policies and an engraved granite stone for the Memorial Garden. Please join our potluck meal after service on December 1, organized by Jane Innerd, and help us decide what sort of tree to install and decorate, tentatively on December 7. Note congregational meetings to vote on whether we are recognized as a Welcoming Congregation (Dec. 15) and on the 2014 budget (Dec. 8). Special thanks to elves John and Linda Upcott for their shopping expertise in providing for the Children's Aid Society family! Our next Board meeting is scheduled on December 19.


Finance Committee Report
