From the Board

At our December meeting of the Board of Trustees, we celebrated not only the congregational approval of the annual budget at a meeting on December 8, but also the historic move by the church to seek recognition as a Welcoming Congregation, made by an overwhelming vote at the Congregational Meeting on December 15, 2013. We will now proceed with the official application to the LGBTQ ministries of the Unitarian Universalist Association to join the 99% of other Unitarian Universalist churches who are already recognized as Welcoming Congregations.

In other work, the Board is actively pursuing the possibility of having the Church become incorporated. This would provide official recognition for the Church as a legal entity while offering important liability protection to Board members. In addition, we are investigating possible Canadian sources for the granite marker to be added to the Memorial Garden. We also set dates for several important events in 2014, namely the Annual General Meeting on February 23, the AUUction on April 20, and the International Dinner on April 27.

Peter LeClair presented the treasurer's report indicating that the Church is within budget and is on track to end the year with a smaller deficit than budgeted. Operating deficits can currently be covered by the surplus accumulated over past years. That surplus, which amounted to \$38,000 at the beginning of the year, together with targeted funds such as the Capital Fund and the Memorial Fund, are invested together with the Lloyd Fund, and income from them provides an important source of revenue for operations. Members of the Board were at pains to emphasize the decisions described here last month: the full Louise Foulds bequest has been added to the Lloyd Fund, and income from the solar project, which is named in honour of Louise, is considered investment income for the Lloyd Fund.

Since Carol Hylton was on vacation, it was left to me to report on the Committee on Ministry (CoM). The CoM is developing a tool for the evaluation of our ministry and how well we are fulfilling our mission, and how the ministry can be improved. The tool should be simple but inclusive: everyone in the church will be invited to contribute. The results will be carefully analyzed and reported, and I anticipate that they will lead to new congregational meeting(s) on our vision and on active steps to implement that vision. In a separate matter, the CoM was pleased to hear that our Minister had played a crucial and effective role in helping a parishioner through a difficult situation. The Board welcomes the weekly teas organized by Reverend Hillman as an informal sounding board for communication and ideas of all sorts. Please join in if you are able!

Our next Board meeting is scheduled at 7 PM on January 16, 2014. As always, you are welcome to attend. Happy New Year!!


