

Welcome and Welcome home! The official, and most active part of the church year will begin September 7 at 10:30 AM. It will include the gathering of the waters from all who wish to contribute. This worship element and experience is meant for many reasons, primarily for each of us to very briefly tell our story since our last gathering in worship. It is not a travelogue, but the place may add to the meaning you wish to share. Despite my extraordinary experiences in Montreal in May and Providence, RI in June, I will be sharing water from Michigan this year. That is because my younger daughter Courtney and I were caught up in the flash floods there on August 11. That experience totaled my wonderful Pontiac with just two payments left! We were bug-eyed but were never in danger. We were out and safe before we had any idea how large and dangerous these waters were. Also, my thanks to Mr. Hillman for safely bringing his truck around to us dead in the water on Thirteen Mile Road near I-75 in Royal Oak and pushing the car up on the public sidewalk of that neighbourhood. What that event meant I will share September 7. And do note that there will be a new container this year as the one that had lasted 13 years and was dense with the waters all had shared those many years froze and burst as I think I didn't pour a little out for expansion or the intense cold of the Winter of 2013-2014.

A most remarkable experience for me, as we close Summer and begin Autumn that in the same election year I have two UU (Unitarian Universalist) friends both campaigning for a city council seat in their respective seats. Victoria Cross in Windsor and Rev. Stefan Jonasson in Winnipeg. All the best to them both! Much joy hearing of their campaigning exploits, of much walking and stairs climbing.

UU Rev. John Wolff was asked by a search committee once whether he was 'theist or atheist' and his response was something like "if you're atheist then I will be theist; if you are theist I will be atheist'. Such a statement is part of the charge of the minister in all our congregations. To assist all in the congregation of whatever theological (or not) stripe to grow as much welcomeness and hospitality to all others in the congregation and out. For that is much of what Unitarian Universalism is about and it makes us strong as an oak and bendable as the willow.

From the Board

At its final meeting before the summer break, held June 19, the Board dealt with several special items in addition to its usual agenda, which consists of reports from trustees, the minister, and the caring committee, and covers such important things as oversight of church finances and Sunday services. The special items involved the assessment of the ministry of the church, repairs to protect the church basement from water incursion, the installation of the memorial stone, a wheelchair purchase, and preparation for a song fest by Jim Scott honoring Pete Seeger. As usual, I will let our Minister, Reverend Christine Hillman, speak for herself while John Upcott will report for the Caring Committee.

As for church finances, although Peter LeClair, as reported by Helen Moore, is still projecting a deficit for the year, we are currently in somewhat better shape than last year, thanks to generous and timely donations as well as frugal operations. The planned Sunday services reported in June have practically all been held. The summer weather was kind to us and allowed good turnouts at the July and August services to enjoy them in relative comfort. One service still to come as I write this is the traditional ingathering service and water ceremony on September 7.

Steve Brennan reported for the Committee on Ministry (CoM) that all comments on 16 ministries of the church were being organized by ministry and will be presented to the Board. The presentation protects the identities of the respondents and omits the self-assessment parts. The Board agreed with the CoM's recommendation that after review, these should be sent to all members of the Olinda Church community. It further agreed that a visioning session should be held this fall in order to consider next steps in the light of the assessment.

Stuart Miller and Walt Sinclair discussed the need for waterproofing the south wall of the basement. Stuart presented quotes from P&S Building Systems for the repair as well as for other possible work, including installation of a new walkway and basement entrance and an electric wheelchair lift. Stuart will ask for additional quotes for the work. The Board set July 27 as the date of a special congregational meeting to consider the work and its cost. By the time of the Congregational meeting, one more quotation from Selective Contractors of Windsor had been received for the waterproofing. While it was more expensive than the P&S Building quote, it laid out more details about the work. Stuart was not available to answer questions, and the congregation voted to proceed with the waterproofing, even at the price of the higher quote if necessary to ensure proper drainage, but it postponed a decision on the ramp and new entrance.

In other property-related news, the Memorial Stone was approved for installation and engraving. In the interim, thanks to Helen's efforts, the stone has been finished and installed. Take a look, perhaps at the end of the water ceremony: it is quite handsome!

Our next Board meeting is scheduled at 7 PM on Thursday, September 18, 2014. All members are welcome to attend.


