



## From the Board

The Board meeting on December 18, 2014, was well attended and well dispatched. We were all happy with the Christmas potluck, held on December 14 in our newly floored basement: the food was bountiful and tasteful, with no discernible competition from the musty or mouldy smells of the past. The vinyl flooring has been cut so precisely that the common quarter-round or shoe molding at the walls is generally not needed. A strip of clear caulking at the base of the walls will provide a sufficient seal. We are still waiting for P&S Building Systems to find time to finish the exterior blanket and grade the ground on the south wall, while trusting that all this work will ensure that no more water seeps into the basement during stormy weather.

One of the major problems identified by the assessment last year was that many experienced some difficulty hearing the Sunday services. The Board considered several possible remedies but felt that the first step should be improvement of our old---and partly failing---sound system. It approved the purchase of new loud speakers and a new mixer-amplifier with several times the power of our old system, together with a new lavalier microphone system. It chose highly rated equipment by Yorkville, manufactured in Canada and supplied by Long and McQuade in Windsor. As the cost was well under \$2000, no congregational meeting was needed to approve the expenditure. Once it is in place, which should be in early January, we will see whether further steps such as an inductive loop system (common in England, especially helpful for listeners with T-coils in their hearing aids, and recommended by several CUC ministers) or an FM broadcast/receiver system (common in the USA) are also needed. As always, feedback from church members will be important.

Another important step taken by the Board was to approve dates for the coming year. The Annual General Meeting of the church has been set for February 22, and this requires that the Annual Report for 2014 be distributed two weeks earlier and that individual reports be submitted already by January 18. The International Dinner is scheduled to be held on March 15 and the AUUction on April 18.

The church finances appear to be in relatively good shape, with the solar panels producing a bit more than their projected 10% return on investment to the Lloyd fund, as summarized on our website. The budget that the Board passed last month was approved at the congregational meeting on December 7.

Our next Board meeting is scheduled at 7 PM on Thursday January 15, 2015. All members of the church are welcome to attend.




