
The congregation will have a chance to confirm the search committee on a vote at the budget meeting on Dec. 11th. Their work will begin after Rev. Keith Kron's visit on Jan. 14th and 15th. Rev. Kron will have meetings with members of the Board and the search committee to help both groups understand the process and to start the search. Thank you to all who agreed to do this very important job.

The Board is going to need your help during the search. Current rules for search committees state that it would be a conflict of interest for anyone to sit on the administrative board and the search committee at the same time. As we need to keep the church going while the search is going on, we ask that you could help us by taking a position on the Board, even if it is only for a short time. If you cannot attend some meetings a short report to a Board member could do. Please consider volunteering as we need you.

To honor two passed members, Sheron Campbell and Joan Meuser, the Board suggested that the congregation bring a Poinsettia on the first or second Sunday in December. These two members sold Poinsettias to the congregation every year and bought supplies for the Food Bank with the profits. This year we are just asking if you could bring one to decorate the church and then take it home. It would be a small but meaningful way to remember them.


Summary:
