From the Board, February 2017




February 2016 Property Committee Report

Annual Congregational Meeting

Interim Minister Rev. Fran 's Column, February 2017

Welcome February. We are midway and more towards spring equinox. Life quickens in the earth, unseen, underground, or hidden in the blush of twigs.
Festina Lente~~Make haste slowly.

During December, the congregation commissioned the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) to seek out their next settled minister. The six individuals who have accepted this trust are: Bobbye Baylis, Cathy Dewhurst, John van Abbema, Linda Upcott, Steve Brennan, and Stuart Miller.

During January, UUA Transitions Director Keith Kron visited Olinda along with CUC staffer Linda Thomson. What a weekend! Keith met with the Board and the MSC, preached Sunday morning, and held conversation with the congregation after lunch. Linda and the MSC have scheduled a weekend in May for the MSC's Start Up Workshop.

Keith also serves as Ministerial Settlement Representative (MSR) for Canada. Keith has knowledge, skill, and experience; his role is to advise, show up, and serve as a resource both to ministers and to congregations. The final choice lies with the congregation.

Similarly, Linda Thomson is a CUC staffer for congregational development; her role is to advise, show up, and offer resources in support of the MSC and congregations.

The congregation entrusts the search process to the MSC; the MSC will scan the field, select and interview potential candidates, and lift up one recommendation to the congregation. A Candidating Week will be scheduled; the candidate will preach two Sundays, and meet with folks the week between. The final choice lies with the congregation.

As Interim Minister (IM), I am also a resource. As IM, I assist with logistics, insights, and communications. I can bring concerns to the attention of the MSC, and offer my response to various documents. I can write a Letter for the Packet. I am available for a mock interview. I am available for feedback on various documents and drafts, e.g. a draft letter of agreement.

I will make no comment on any particular candidate. No comment. Ever.
And when Candidating Week arrives, sometime after Easter 2018, the IM gets out of town, available for pastoral emergencies, but otherwise out of sight. And a new ministry, never seen before, will arise as the candidate and the congregation meet one another.

Festina Lente—we make haste, but slowly, surely, carefully, and with respect for all engaged in this process of ministerial settlement and transition.

Finance Committee Report

Much to our delight, we will have a surplus for 2016 in the Operating Budget. In spite of taking none of the budgeted \$15,000 from the Lloyd Fund, we ended the year with a surplus of almost \$3000. The generosity of our members and friends is also to thank for a healthy Memorial Fund balance of nearly \$16,000 even after spending almost \$5000 on a new front door and a picture window for the Library.

We used the aUuction balance to pay for new flooring in the kitchen plus new windows for the rest of the Manse. Actually we did not have that much money in the aUuction fund so the Capital Fund paid the difference, to be repaid by future aUuctions. Even after having “donated” \$8637 to pay for the windows, the Capital Fund balance is over \$16,000. It is good to know we have a healthy cushion in the Capital Fund should one (or both) of our elderly furnaces give up the ghost.

Now the aUuction Fund owes the Capital Fund over \$8000, so we all need to start thinking seriously what goods and services we will be bringing to the next aUuction in April. Watch for the sign-up list to come in sometime in the next weeks.

Social Responsibility Committee Report

On Sunday, Feb. 12, at noon, the Social Responsibility Committee is presenting a film, following a Sandwich Exchange.* The film is titled *Capturing Grace*, directed by Dave Iverson, released in April, 2015. The running time is 64 minutes.

Summary: It seems like two disparate realms. One occupied by some of the most acclaimed dancers in the world, people who move for a living. The other occupied by people who often struggle to move, people who have Parkinson's disease. This is the story of what happens when those worlds intersect. We followed individuals with Parkinson's as they prepared to stage a first ever dance performance, under the tutelage of two long time dancers at the Mark Morris Dance Group [Brooklyn]. It's a story about determination, adversity, contending with doubt, the transformative power of art and the strength of the human spirit. This is the story of a remarkable community of dancers who have come together to rediscover the meaning of grace.





Why I Wear a Safety Pin

Since November I have been in the habit of wearing a safety pin on my clothing. The idea of wearing a safety pin originated in the U.K. after the Brexit vote because of the sharp increase in the incidence of hate crimes and the harassment of individuals on the streets. After the Presidential election a similar phenomenon was observed in the America .

The reason for doing so and why I wear a safety pin is to express solidarity with those affected and as a commitment to action. While there has been criticism of the practice by some activists who argue that it does nothing to address the systemic issues of racial injustice and serves merely to make some white people feel better about themselves. I work in a university library where I interact with lots of people of diverse backgrounds, many of whom are young.

My hope is that when a person sees my safety pin, they will know it is safe to talk to me and get any necessary help. It may be only a small gesture but I hope that it is one which will have a positive impact, however small, in making the world a better and a safer place.

Olinda UU Transition News

A congregational meeting was held at the Church Sunday, January 15; and, the Search Committee had a further meeting that afternoon with Rev. Kron and Rev. Thomson. In the interest of keeping everyone informed, here is a little more information about what you can expect over the next eight months. The Search Committee appreciated the questions and suggestions from the congregation and made a commitment to be mindful of all members' concerns.

The process seems long to many, but we are working with the schedule and the conditions set by the American and Canadian Unitarian Universalist Head offices. They have spent years working out the best practices and we were constantly told we should do our homework well and to take our time to find a minister that would be a best fit for Olinda.

This month we are reading and studying all we can find on the subject. The two main source documents are the "Transition Ministry Handbook", already used by the Interim Search Committee to find an Interim Minister; and, the "Settlement Handbook for Ministers and Congregations." Both are published by the UUA, and you may find and read them at transitions@uua.org. If you can set aside the time, you are urged you to look up these handbooks and study them, so that you will be as up to date as the Search Committee.

By March and April, the Search Committee should be in a position to organize focus groups to determine the wishes of all congregants. We will need everyone's participation in this activity for two reasons: a) to gain knowledge of your views and needs before we advertise for a minister; and, (b) to show prospective applicants how supportive you are in finding the right minister for our needs.

To attract the best minister, we will need a high rate of response on these questionnaires. No one would like to start a career with us if a large percentage of congregants fail to return the questionnaires or absent themselves from the focus groups. Please be forthright in your responses and discussions. Open communications and high participation will be a huge asset to our task.

An all-day retreat for Search Committee members will be held in early May. Rev Linda Thomson, or her stand-in, will guide us in our deliberations. From there on, an information packet about our church will be prepared for the UUA for distribution to prospective applicants. The UUA will collect packets from applicants and handle the exchange of packets between our Church and interested applicants.

This summer will be super busy for the Search Committee and an interesting year for all of us. You will be kept informed of our monthly progress through this column in the Newsletter.
