## From the Board, March 2017

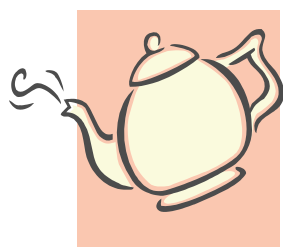
First let me say thank you to all members who are leaving the Board. You have worked well and made my job much easier.

The congregation owes you a great deal of thanks. I have some knowledge of who will be next on the Board and I am looking forward to another good and exciting year.

April 8<sup>th</sup> was set as the date of our next AUUction. The funds from this will be used to repay the capital fund for the new windows. Please keep that date open and plan to attend. You can either donate a service or something that can be auctioned off. This is our biggest fundraiser of the year. Even if you do not donate, please come and have a good time and bid on some great stuff. Plans for the day have not been finalized but stay tuned for more details.

The Board completed a six-month review on how the interim process is going. This is not an appraisal of Rev. Fran but more on the congregation and the work we have done. The transition team has done a review, now the Board has done one and Rev. Fran has completed hers. They all will be sent to Rev. Kron and the U.U.A. The Board was very clear that the process to find a settled minister was right on track and that with Rev. Fran's assistance we will remain that way. There will be another review at the twelve month mark.

At the time of this writing the Olinda A.G.M. has not taken place. It is an important time to look back with the committee reports, the minutes of the special congregational meetings and to look at the financial health of the church. This is a time to look forward to a new Board with renewed energy, to the search for a settled minister, whatever form that will take, and to work together to grow our liberal religion in this community and beyond.

## Interim Minister Rev. Fran 's Column, March 2017

March marches in—more birds, more buds, and at last spring equinox. The lunar, solar and traditional calendars meet and merge; this year the entire month of March lies within the season of Lent—a time for deep reflection and mindfulness.

I like Lent. I like the idea of sustained intentionality. Some folks like to give something up for Lent—one friend gave up her seat on the crowded Boston T-Line. Some folks give up meat for Lent—I like the idea, and the economy, of letting the spring lambs gambol in the meadows for a while, enjoying the first grass and the fresh air.

Me, I get more excited about taking on something new, rather than giving something up. In Anchorage Alaska, when I sang with the Martin Luther King Citywide Choir, we were invited to consider MLK Day as a day on, not a day off. A day on. A day of intentional activity. So that's another way to think of Lent—as a time on, a time of intentional and positive action. I've taken up the notion of writing a weekly letter to my members of parliament this first quarter of the year. Perhaps I can persist through a March of mindfulness and communication.

On another day, what might I do? Go for a walk each day? Watch for birds? Watch how the sun arrives a little earlier each day? Or to repeat some familiar task more faithfully, more lovingly, more care-fully....This year I'd like to undertake some intentional reading—such as sermons and other writings by my colleagues. I'd like to better understand this business of 'call'—vocation literally means call, what one is called to do. How did my colleagues discern their call? How do I discern mine?

Unitarian Universalist aspirants to ministry each emerge from their own unique life history. I know of one minister who paid his way through college working summers in an iron foundry. Me, I was a sailor. Some hear the call very young—ministry is all they ever wanted to do. Some try a few other things first, but the call finds them out, and leads them forth.

So that's my aspiration for Lent—to listen for the call, not just my own, but the call that drew my colleagues to this work. To read a book a day, or a chapter a day, or a sermon a day. To listen for the still small voice that drew, not just me, but others, to do what they do. I wonder what draws you to do what you do.....

## Soles for Souls

In February, the Bio Ped Footcare Clinics continued their charitable collection of used shoes for needy people in the Dominican Republic. A successful drive was organized in Haiti in 2015, with their motto..."Wearing Out Poverty."

Many in these countries walk barefoot. As a result of the shoe drives, foot-care is improved, children can play sports and attend school, women can work in places where shoes are mandatory. The program provides employment for others to repair, stitch and glue footwear before they are taken to market. The goal this year was to collect 100,000 pairs of shoes. We were able to collect at least five donation boxes (two carloads) of good quality used shoes from Olinda U.U. Thank you everyone for your generosity. These shoes will be distributed in the Dominican Republic in April 2017.

## Support for a Sister Faith Community

The tragic shooting of Muslims at prayer in a Quebec City Mosque, has touched all of us in many significant ways. How one person can be so violently callous towards strangers, whose religion and customs he does not understand, is incomprehensible.

I did not know the victims, but I have had a uniquely profound and personal relationship with them. They are and were, my people. After World War II my family, also, were immigrants to Canada. Like our Muslim friends, we dressed differently, and did not speak the language when we arrived. We were poor and did not know the customs of this country. We were escaping from the harsh economic conditions in our native land and the threat of war with Russia in Europe. Lifetime friends and relations were given up to pursue a better future for all of us.

Since then we have come to know many immigrants from many lands. We have all lived a similar path of separation from the familiar and hope for the future. Hard work, intelligence and support from Canada and Canadians have moved us on to greater freedoms and opportunities, especially for the next generation.

Sharon and I had the good fortune in recent years to become surrogate grandparents to an Arab family. The youngest child, age ten at the time, is now studying law at the City University in London, England. Her dream is to become a lawyer for women who cannot afford to pay for lawyer's services when they need them. We are grateful to have had this opportunity to assist.

For these reasons, we were out to a vigil on a cold winter night in Kingsville on January 30 to show solidarity with the Muslim community, along with other Unitarian Universalists from Olinda. Rev Fran Dearman led the service in style and with meaning.

May we, our families and our community, all be safe from unprovoked violence.

Let us live together IN PEACE. Ensha'allah
