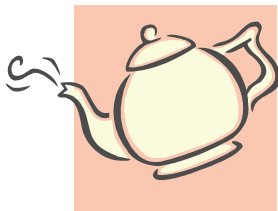

## Fran's Column for OLINDA Newsletter, June 2017

Early last month Olinda welcomed UUA Transitions Director Keith Kron, along with the Rev. Stephen Atkinson. Stephen is newly appointed as the UUA's Transitions Coach for Canada, and currently serves as a hospital chaplain in Hamilton, Ontario.

I had the privilege of hosting Stephen as he stayed on after the Start Up Workshop for the Olinda Ministerial Search Committee (MSC). Stephen had accepted our invitation to preach about his own path to ministry, and how he had become aware of his own white privilege. Stephen shared a reflection on aspirations and actualities, referring to the recent clash of expectations around police participation in the Gay Pride Parade and Black Lives Matter in Toronto.

This sermon constituted Olinda's formal participation in the UUA's White Supremacy Teach-In. Here in Essex County we too have shadowed portions of our history to shine a light upon and acknowledge. Needless to say, the work is ongoing. I will be glad to hear from you any items of interest on the topic that you might wish to pass along, for future sermons on the topic....

Stephen's visit was a treat for me, rare time for extended conversation with a colleague while conveying Stephen from and to the ViaRail Station at Chatham. And my esteemed colleague asked a question: what do I do with the time?

Stephen and I both served the same very busy, intense, staff driven congregation in West Vancouver, a medium sized congregation with many programmes, many meetings, much teaching, and for me at least two full days per week at the church building on task with staff.

Stephen wondered how different my week must be, serving the semi-rural parish of Olinda.

The longer answer is that my week has about the same shape it always has: Sunday is a day on; Monday is my Sabbath; Tuesday is an administration day; Wednesday is walkabout day, for visiting or undertakings out of the ordinary ambit, e.g. driving in to Windsor to pick up a book order at Biblioasis; Thursdays, again, administration, especially special projects like sifting my predecessor's bookshelves; Friday I work at home on sermon preparation; Saturday is a day off, unless someone wants to meet for morning coffee. Not so different from the big city routine—with this exception: I have learned here in Essex County that a big part of my job is to show up, to build up the strands in the web of community that connect us to our friends and neighbours.

So the short answer is: I show up. I sing with the County Classic Chorale, a great place to meet the neighbours. I attend meetings of the Leamington Ministerial. I stand by at the Remembrance Day observance. I go to Old Bank theatre. I drop in at the Leamington Arts Centre. And everywhere I go, folks ask me who I am, and I tell them, and then they tell me about the event they once attended at the Olinda church, and who they know and how they know them. At a small, family sized congregation in a semi-rural parish, I go where I'm invited, and I show up.

Yours, for the interim, and may your summer be warm and wonderful.

## Membership Committee Report, June 2017

The Membership Committee was very busy less than a year ago, making sure our records of communication were updated and accurate. Thanks to all of you for your co-operation, we were able to publish the September 2016 Church Directory and the Telephone Tree. The latter had a couple revisions made recently by Bobbye Baylis and a few copies were placed on the library table.

Another responsibility of the Membership Committee is to ensure that there is clarity and accuracy of our church membership record. In the year 2017, this has presented a new challenge for us; according to new CRA government regulations for non-profit organizations, any person named as a member of the church is entitled to vote on future legal decisions. Consequently, not only is there a need to review our current membership list (which includes both voting and non-voting members), for the sake of complying with government regulations, we have to ensure our membership list consists of only those who are entitled to vote in preparation for calling a new minister.

To accomplish our goal of creating an accurate membership record, there are a few important steps to take. First of all, we truly value all people who wanted to have a connection with our church. In order to maintain this bond, we are planning on transferring the names of those on our current membership list, who primarily have been inactive within the church for a year or more, to a newly created "Legacy List". This Legacy List would be included along with the Membership List in our church Annual Reports, as a record for our church history. We have also considered creating a "Friends of the Church" list representing those who have donated to our church but prefer not to become a member.

Secondly, the Board will have to amend the Membership By-Laws to accommodate this change and the new government regulation. A Special Congregational Meeting to vote on the amendments will be scheduled tentatively before the end of 2017. Our current Membership By-Laws have been included at the end of this report for your review.

Finally, there is time for people to ask questions or express their concerns regarding this future change of our church membership document. As a reminder, Membership Committee members are Bobbye Baylis, Helen Moore, and Sharon van Abbema. Rev. Fran Dearman is also glad to answer questions. If we can work together, this transition can be made as smoothly as possible. We are all a part of this church family, regardless of which historical record preserves your name.

## Membership By-Laws (1984)

### Article IV. Membership

1. Membership in this Church shall be open to any person sixteen (16) years of age or over who
  - a) is in general agreement with its purpose; and
  - b) requests in writing that his/her name be entered in the membership book.
2. In order to be eligible to vote a person shall
  - a) have been a member for at least thirty (30) days; and
  - b) have made a contribution of record in the preceding twelve (12) months.
3. Membership shall terminate when a member
  - a) by notice in writing resigns from membership; or
  - b) cannot be located; or
  - c) does not respond to a letter of inquiry.
4. Membership records shall be maintained by the Membership and Publicity Trustee who, in consultation with the Treasurer and the Minister, shall conduct an annual review of the membership roll and report same to the Annual Congregational Meeting. The membership roll shall also be reviewed before any Special Congregational Meeting at which a vote is taken.
5. Membership shall not be a requirement for participation in the services and activities of this Church.





## Kindness

Now, one useful thing you can do with an old person is ask: “Looking back, what do you regret?” And they’ll tell you. So, what do I regret? Being poor from time to time? Working terrible jobs? The occasional humiliation? Not really. But here’s something I do regret:

In seventh grade, this new kid joined our class. When nervous, which was pretty much always, she had a habit of taking a strand of hair into her mouth and chewing on it. So she came to our school and our neighborhood, and was mostly ignored, occasionally teased (‘Your hair taste good?’ — that sort of thing). I could see this hurt her.

I still remember the way she’d look after such an insult: eyes cast down, a little gut-kicked, as if, having just been reminded of her place in things, she was trying, as much as possible, to disappear. At home, I imagined, after school, her mother would say, you know: ‘How was your day, sweetie?’ and she’d say, ‘Oh, fine.’ And her mother would say, ‘Making any friends?’ and she’d go, ‘Sure, lots.’ — And then they moved. That was it. No tragedy, no big final hazing. End of story. But still, it bothers me.

Now, why do I regret that? Why, forty-two years later, am I still thinking about it? Relative to most of the other kids, I was actually pretty nice to her. I never said an unkind word to her. In fact, I sometimes even (mildly) defended her. So here’s something I know to be true:

What I regret most in my life are failures of kindness. Or, to look at it from the other end of the telescope: Who, in your life, do you remember most fondly, with the most undeniable feelings of warmth? Those who were kindest to you, I bet. It’s a little facile, but I’d say, as a goal in life, you could do worse than: Try to be kinder. Because kindness is hard — it starts out all rainbows and puppy dogs, and expands to include . . . well, everything.

To the extent that you can, err in the direction of kindness. Do those things that incline you toward the big questions, and avoid the things that would reduce you and make you trivial. That luminous part of you that exists beyond personality — your soul, if you will — is as bright and shining as any that has ever been. Clear away everything that keeps you separate from this secret luminous place. Believe it exists, come to know it better, nurture it, share its fruits tirelessly.
