Landmarks

November tends to invite time for reflection and the recognition of landmarks. Along with the anniversary of our church, we are also recognizing a century of remembrance in the tricky realms of war and peace. In Mexico, November also heralds a time to remember our dead, as well as to consider what it means to be alive.

As we make our lives in the county, Sarah and I are reaching many of the landmarks of settling into the community. For me, that includes a pass to Point Pelee and access to the athletic facilities on Sherk Street, where we find activities that promote healthy living.

Also among these landmarks is a **new landline** – with a local 519 area code – which will be available for you in the revised directory. I'm also spending time at local establishments, such as the Lakeside Café, where you can find me for **drop-in hours** on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. These are times when you can generally expect to find me regularly, but you can also set up appointments to talk with me, either in person or by phone. You can simply e-mail or phone me, and we'll look for a time that works!

Another landmark of being in community is the opportunity to vote in local elections. Sarah and I were able to do that in October – along with many of you. This is part of the democratic process, named in the **Unitarian Universalist 5th principle**. But the democratic process goes far beyond one day of voting, and includes other kinds of engagement, involvement, and getting informed on the issues that matter to us. A lot of democracy happens in between elections, and we'll have a chance to explore how the democratic process goes beyond the ballot.

One way I have been involved is by continuing to meet with Leamington Ministerial and I'm encouraged to see that we can share ministry in the wider community with fellow communities of faith. I see this group from different traditions share many of our common goals in the service of humanity, and I look forward to seeing what we can achieve together.

In pursuing the wisdom that different faith traditions have to offer, we may also begin to explore the meaning of different scriptures – and of other sources of inspiration in our lives. Following the viewing of a documentary on scriptural history and scholarship, I have heard interest in a small group series to go deeper in discussion and discovery.

I am pleased that **John Upcott** invites us to consider and celebrate our church's history on **November 4**. I'll be away that first week of November as I participate in the *Parliament of World Religions* in Toronto, after which I will also attend a seminar on *Church and Charity Law* in Mississauga. When I return, we will continue to explore the reflective aspects of this month together!



The Person You Mean to Be

by Dolly Chugh (320 pp, Harper Business, available September 2018). Nonfiction. An inspiring guide from Dolly Chugh, an award-winning social psychologist at the New York University Stern School of Business, on how to confront difficult issues including sexism, racism, inequality, and injustice so that you can make the world (and yourself) better. Many of us believe in equality, diversity, and inclusion. But how do we stand up for those values in our turbulent world? *The Person You Mean to Be* is the smart, "semi-bold" person's guide to fighting for what you believe in. Chugh reveals the surprising causes of inequality, grounded in the "psychology of good people". Using her research findings in unconscious bias as well as work across psychology, sociology, economics, political science, and other disciplines, she offers practical tools to respectfully and effectively talk politics with family, to be a better colleague to people who don't look like you, and to avoid being a well-intentioned barrier to equality. Being the person we mean to be starts with a look at ourselves. Whether you are a long-time activist or new to the fight, you can start from where you are. Through the compelling stories Chugh shares and the surprising science she reports, she guides each of us closer to being the person we mean to be.
