

One Goal: A Coach, a Team, and the Game That Brought a Divided <u>Town Together</u>

When thousands of Somali refugees resettled in Lewiston, Maine, a struggling, overwhelmingly white town, longtime residents grew uneasy. Then the mayor wrote a letter asking Somalis to stop coming, which became a national story. While scandal threatened to subsume the town, its high school's soccer coach integrated Somali kids onto his team, and their passion began to heal old wounds. Taking readers behind the tumult of this controversial team—and onto the pitch where the teammates vied to become state champions and achieved a vital sense of understanding—One Goal is a timely story about overcoming the prejudices that divide us.

Financial Report

I am very thankful for the 29 voting members that attended the Congregational Budget Meeting on December 2. I personally thank President John Upcott for allowing me to present the 2019 budget for the membership's approval.

After your confidence in approving the ~\$28,300 deficit budget for 2018, it was my honour to report that we were on track to finish the year with only ~\$7603 deficit but I challenged those present to prove me incorrect and finish 2018 in the black. Treasurer Helen Moore and myself with be sitting down with the final 2018 figures in the coming weeks but I feel confident that you rose to the challenge and completed the year strong.

With this in mind, I appreciated the affirmative vote that the members gave to the 2019 proposed budget with a ~\$6900 deficit. We will still have two big projects: incorporation and the installation of Rev. Rod as our called minister.

We have the mid-week luncheons coming up Jan 16, Feb 20 and TBA in March with good intentions of offsetting this deficit. Last year's luncheons and bakeless bake sale were a great way to decrease our proposed deficit along with frugal committees and dedicated volunteers doing multiple jobs. My appreciation to all with whatever they helped with.

Social Responsibility Committee Report

At the December meeting, the committee discussed several possible activities to undertake in 2019:

- Annual International Dinner will be on March 24, 2019. The topic being considered is the Opioid Crisis and possible speakers for that Sunday were proposed.
- Films that could be shown after church: Logistics of cost-effective download or streaming are being studied.
- Rev. Rod has been looking into organizing Naloxone training at the church, something he did in Ottawa. Any person can go to a pharmacy with an OHIP card and get a Naloxone kit, but a workshop would be better.
- Palm oil production is destroying vast tracts of tropical forest and removing rare animal habitat. We are considering taking this on as an Olinda issue. We will all read up on this and think about how we might be active in increasing awareness.

Honouring Our Lives' Landmarks

Over the past few weeks, you may have noticed that the invitation to share our Joys & Sorrows during the service has some new words. As always, we are still invited to share significant parts of our lives in the company of our community – personal landmarks in our lives, such as birthdays, visits from friends, illnesses, or deaths of loved ones. These are things in our personal lives that are cause for celebration, or in which we'd appreciate support from our community.

We now also have a portion beforehand where some current events, and their impact, are acknowledged from the pulpit, recognizing that what touches one affects us all. Of course, witness to world events and political matters are important to our faith community – they are part of our covenant to affirm and promote respect for the interdependent web of which we are all part, as well as the free and responsible search for truth, and our commitment to democratic processes. This work has a place at our church.

These are also complicated matters — with opinions and viewpoints that are often a matter of debate. It can be frustrating to hear someone else's opinion without the opportunity to reply, and potential unscripted debates during a service can be unwelcoming to newcomers. For this reason, we are keeping the deeper conversations about world events, politics, and social advocacy, to other portions of the service — such as the sermon or presentation — or in other opportunities of congregational involvement, such as the Social Responsibility Committee, Board meetings, or other groups.

We'll continue to acknowledge current events from the pulpit during our worship services, while also honouring personal sharing during Joys & Sorrows. Since the events in our own lives – and our feelings about them – are not up for debate, we acknowledge them in community. And your intentional participation in this ritual – by sharing of your lives or witnessing to others' – nourishes our community spirit.
