Social Responsibility Report

The Social Responsibility Committee has been very busy lately, organizing the International Dinner and Naloxone Clinic and also working on the logistics of showing the film *Come Sunday* after church someday soon.

The International Dinner (luncheon) will be after church on March 24, with donations going to Brandon Bailey's group whose members are active in preventing opioid overdoses. The dishes will be prepared by committee members and may (or may not) have an international flare. Basically whatever the committee members like to make for pot-lucks! After the luncheon, there will be a Naloxone Clinic presented by Brandon Bailey. It will give us all an opportunity to learn about the opioid crisis and preventative measures.

We want to thank Rev. Rod for his diligent research in developing an Honour Statement for our church. His conversations with the local Caldwell Band will assure that our Honour Statement has relevance to our locality and speaks to future actions rather than just being words. After all, Mike Fox put up travelling band members overnight; he did not just talk about respecting them.

In keeping with themes from recent years (supporting Syrian and other refugees, migrant workers, Downtown Mission, House of Sophrosyne), we now are on record as supporters of those who supply shelter, food, and other necessities to those in need. Property Committee Report


I want to thank Doug Whaley for taking care of the snow removal.
