## **Clergy Connection**

It was at the aUUction last year when I first met many of you while candidating, so taking part in this year's fundraiser on April 27 brought up much anticipation and a sense that we've completed our first cycle in our shared ministry.

And we were witnesses to this at the **Installation Ceremony** on **April 14**, when we formally celebrated what we have already been practicing since August. We also spoke some of our commitments and expectations for each other during the Act of Installation. I was very moved and pleased with everyone's participation! As often happens, I am unable to name and thank everyone here... but I am grateful!

Putting together the Installation Ceremony was its own witness of our shared ministry. A small task force with John Upcott and Susan Vary helped me coordinate the many parts that needed consideration in the service. Jane Innerd led the service, and shared the pulpit with our guest preacher, Rev. Debra Faulk, who has been mentoring me over the past few years. As I speak with many of you, I see that the Charge to the Congregation, which was shared by Rev. Kathy Sage and Rev. Dr. Stephen Atkinson, is resonating with you. And I paid close attention to the Charge to the Minister that Rev. Linda Thomson spoke to me.

I was very pleased with the warm welcome you all offered to my family and Sarah's, especially during the reception hosted by the Hospitality Team, led by Mariette Preyde. The Choir and Karen Miller's flute reminded us of the meaning of Covenant through music. And, in addition to her accompaniment, Lorie Lyons also arranged for the flowers that I have now shared with some of our members who cannot attend church regularly, bringing a bit of the Installation – and our community – to them!

The flowers that are blooming around us this season were well represented on Easter, as Toni Janik added some yellow roses, in memory of her mother, to our bouquets. She also brought in some Ukrainian Easter Eggs, which helped me illustrate the beauty of our earth — as well as its fragility. Many of us have also seen this symbolism of precious fragility in the burning of Notre Dame de Paris Cathedral, along with the stories of resilience that are coming from it.

We also share the grief that comes from the tragic attacks of multiple churches and buildings in Sri Lanka, with a terrible human cost. Along with the sadness that this brings, we also remember that shared ministry across faiths remains vital during these times. I was able to share in these sentiments at a vigil in Charles Clark Square on April 25, expressing our faith that healing may yet flower.

And... we have more flowers in store – at our **Flower Celebration on June 2**, the tradition started by Czech Unitarian Norbert Čapek, there is a flower with your name on it.

I will need to be **away** for part of early May, as I gather with Canadian UU Ministers in Calgary, from **April 29-May 4**, and again from **May 9-12** to meet with the Board of the Canadian Unitarian Council in Toronto. I will resume my regular café hours on May 14. I hope to see you soon!



## **The House of Broken Angels**

by **Luis Alberto Urrea** (336 pp, Little, Brown and Company, 2018) Fiction.



In his final days, beloved and ailing patriarch Miguel Angel de La Cruz, affectionately called Big Angel, has summoned his entire clan for one last legendary birthday party. But as the party approaches, his mother, nearly one hundred, dies, transforming the weekend into a farewell double header. Among the guests is Big Angel's half-brother, known as Little Angel, who must reckon with the truth that although he shares a father with his siblings, he has not, as a half gringo, shared a life. Across two bittersweet days in their San Diego neighborhood, the revelers mingle among the palm trees and cacti, celebrating the lives of Big Angel and his mother, and recounting the many inspiring tales that have passed into family lore, the acts both ordinary and heroic that brought these citizens to a fraught and sublime country and allowed them to flourish in the land they have come to call home.
