## **Clergy Connection**

Our year is now underway, and the Committee on Shared Ministry is exploring how we may serve each other more fully. I've already been hearing new ideas coming from many of you, and these are precisely what we'll be considering at our monthly meetings. Some of these may take time to implement, and not everything might stick, but it will be a journey we'll share together. Do not hesitate to connect with the **Shared Ministry** team, including me, Carol Hylton, Mariette Preyde, and Steve Brennan.

We've already begun trying out new ways to offer children's programming and seeing how it fits in the larger scheme of Lifespan Learning in our congregation. Last month and this one, we have been trying out alternating weeks of intergenerational services, intended to be more inclusive for all ages, with Sunday mornings that have children's programming downstairs, when our younger folks explore our faith in their own space. Over the year, we will be figuring out what mix of children's programming and intergenerational services works best for our children and those of us who offer this service.

This is a time for some bold experimentation, and that may mean some tweaks to our Sunday liturgy over several months. Some of these changes will be temporary, and we'll be keeping the ones that we see serve us best.

And we're always on the lookout for volunteers who can help ensure that there are always two adults during our children's programming. This does not necessarily mean teaching, but simply offering your presence for the sake of safety. If you're thinking about this, it's never too early to get a Vulnerable Sector Background Check – it's free and only takes about a week. You can get your forms at the welcome table, from me or from anyone at the Religious Education Committee.

I'd also like to remind everyone that this year I am taking my **Sabbath day on Tuesdays**, rather than Mondays. And you're welcome to drop in during **Café Hours** on **Wednesdays and Fridays**, from **2-5pm**, at the Lakeside Bakery in Leamington – and you can also call or e-mail me for an appointment at a time that suits us better.

And as we get ready for November, I invite you to look for **mementos and photos** that honour our dead, and which you are welcome to bring on November 3 for our annual **Day of the Dead** commemoration. Everyone who has lost someone, whether recently or some time ago, is invited to bring something that reminds us of our dearly departed.

I will be away in the latter part of October as I take part in some collegial activities, but you can continue to connect with me by phone or on line. I also look forward to celebrating Thanksgiving alongside you this month!
