This January was a very full time for many members of our church, and for people who are dear to some of our members. Many of you were able to attend the memorial services for Dorothy Brown and Wally Glass, taking time to commemorate and celebrate their life, as a community. Others among you have also been looking after yourselves, as well as after people who are important to you.

This past month, we also had an opportunity to get better acquainted with some of the stories and teachings of the Caldwell First Nation, as Carrie Ann Peters, their Cultural Development Coordinator, was our guest speaker on Jan. 12. She is enthusiastic about visiting us again for the **International Dinner** on **Mar. 8**. While here, she extended an invitation to a teaching on indigenous medicines on January 19, which I was able to attend. You are welcome to attend a teaching on the **Pipe Ceremony** on **Feb.** 2 at the **Caldwell First Nation Band Hall** at 14 Orange St. **starting at 12:30pm**, and going until about 3pm.

And, during **Black History Month**, we'll also have more opportunities to delve deeper into stories we don't hear often enough, as our guest speaker **Irene Moore Davis** tells us more about the black lives in our region on **Feb. 9**. I'll be sorry to miss that service, as I will be **away Feb. 7-9**, while attending the **Mid-winter Retreat** and further connecting with our denomination in southwestern Ontario – so I look forward to hearing what you learned from Irene!

I should also mention that the **Committee on Shared Ministry** held its retreat on **Jan. 25**, taking some time to consider our past experience, historic and recent, as well as looking to our future challenges and aspirations. This was an opportunity to take a deeper look at the priorities of the church and envision some strategies that invite us to thrive. Steve Brennan offers more detail in the CoSM report.

One of the topics we discussed was how we could better serve LGBTQ+ folks in our larger community, which will invite further exploration in the coming months. This is also a conversation that is being carried out among our neighbours of faith, as I saw first-hand at an affirming ministry gathering that was held at Tecumseh United Church on Dec. 23. I also plan to attend a follow-up gathering on Feb. 11, as we search for shared opportunities to affirm the experience of a marginalized community.

Another interfaith connection was possible when my colleagues from Leamington Ministerial invited me to attend the Prayer for Christian Unity on Jan. 21 at the Municipal Building, and we were able to share a collegial lunch afterward.

I was glad to be with the community coming together on Jan. 22 for our **Soup Lunch Fundraiser** – I look forward to seeing you at the next one on **Feb. 26**. And don't forget to be part of our church's decision making at our **AGM** on **Feb. 23**!

#### **Committee on Shared Ministry (CoSM):**

- It has been a while since the Committee on Ministry now called the Committee on Shared Ministry (CoSM) has had an update in the newsletter: almost 5 years to be exact!
- This article will bring the congregation up to speed as what has happened since 2015, why and where the NEW CoSM is at currently. There is a fuller accounting to be found in the upcoming 2019 Annual Report due out in a few weeks.
- From the historical perspective, the Committee on Ministry went through the following journey since 2015:
  - As per the guidelines set out by UUA, the Committee on Ministry (CoM) that existed at the time of Rev. Christine Hillman's death in 2015 folded.
  - This action provided the way for the establishment of a Transitional Minister Search Committee who, in 2016, recommended and the congregation subsequently approved Rev. Fran Dearman being brought in as the two year Interim Minister in 2016;
  - At that time, the Transitional Search Committee became the Transitional Support Committee for Rev. Fran during her two (2) year transitional tenure. During this time there was no CoM structured due to the nature of Rev. Fran's tenure being both short term and with the specific purpose of preparing the Olinda Congregation to conduct a formal Ministerial Search for their next minister;
  - In 2017, the Ministerial Search Committee was established, whose purpose it was to pursue the process of finding a minister to recommend to the congregation; and
  - In 2018, the Search Committee made the recommendation to the Olinda Congregation to offer a call to Rev. Rodrigo Solano-Quesnel. In April of the same year the Olinda Congregation did so and Rev. Rod made the decision to accept.
- With the arrival of Rev. Rod in Sept. 2018, the UUA guidelines provided for the reestablishment of a Committee of Ministry. Under the auspices of the UUA, a change concerning the focus of the CoM had occurred during the intervening three years with the name now being the Committee on Shared Ministry (CoSM).
- Moving forward, the Board of Directors and Rev. Rod worked towards the reconfiguration of the CoM with the first meeting being held on May 18, 2019. Together they decided that membership in the CoSM would be offered to current community members who were part of the former 2015 Committee and still expressing an interest in continuing. It is important to note that the 2015 CoM that folded at the time of Rev. Hillman's death had just been created, and had not had the opportunity to meet prior to Rev. Hillman's death. It was agreed therefore that establishing the current Committee in this way provided an appropriate beginning for this new CoSM.

#### **Committee on Shared Ministry, Cont.**

- For the initial period, it was also agreed by the CoSM members that Rev. Rod would act as chairperson in order for the establishment of a basic foundation to the committee's purpose and responsibilities to occur.
- The current Committee has met six (6) times to date, inclusive of a half day retreat held Jan. 25, 2020. As a result, the CoSM has arrived at their purpose having five (5) particular tasks:
- 1. The CoSM would assist the Olinda congregation in "setting directions" rather than in "making decisions" for them;
- 2. The CoSM would be about working in collaboration, embodying the concept of "covenant", seeking alignment with Olinda community mission statement;
- 3. The CoSM would focus on "ministries" rather than "Governance";
- 4. The CoSM would encourage exploration of assumptions and voids encourage the Olinda community to be open to curiosity and innovation;
- 5. The CoSM would assist the Olinda congregation to explore/examine current ways of handling the balance of differences and commonalities;
- At their half day retreat the members identified the following focus for the coming year:

  The oversight of the five (5) areas of CoSM involvement found within the *Letter of Call and Ministry Agreement* signed between the Board and Rev. Rod on April 22, 2018;
  - Principle initial oversight completion of the *Review for Preliminary Fellowship Evaluation* of Rev. Rod before the end of June, 2020;
  - Oversight of the identified concern within the Olinda UU Community regarding the dwindling church membership and future sustainability of the church as a whole; and
  - Identification of processes, in conjunction with all Olinda UU church ministries, which will support and augment the Olinda UU Community's sustainability.
- As the CoSM prepares to move into an active year, it also recognizes that it is still in its initial phases of formation. As such the members view a key focus of their next stage to be outreach to all ongoing ministries for the purpose of supporting their continued and renewed focus around the health and vibrancy of the Olinda UU congregational community.
- We all look forward to working with the board, the congregation and the extended community in this coming year.
