From The Board

Happy New Year to all and Welcome to 2021!

In the past month two important church membership meetings were held.

At the first meeting, the church membership passed the fiscal budget for the current 2021 year, a budget that was developed to provide financial oversight for a year that will continue to be heavily influenced by the COVID pandemic.

At the second meeting, the church members voted to adopt the NEW bylaws under which the church, as a federal corporation, will now be operating. These new Bylaws are the culmination of ten months of intense work, effort and volunteer time put in by the Bylaw Committee, under the leadership of Bobbye Baylis.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the board and all the various committee members for their hours of volunteer work that went into preparing these documents over the last ten months, documents that have now become an integral part of UU Olinda moving forward.

Together with the passing of the new bylaws, the Nomination Committee for 2021 was approved and will now be reaching out to the congregation for members to step into Director Positions. Under the new bylaws, Directors will be nominated and appointed to the board by the congregational membership at the Annual Congregational Meeting. Following their appointment, the Directors will then decide amongst themselves what positions they will fill on the executive. There are five required positions: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and Finance Committee chairperson.

It is with regret that I inform the community that I am removing my name from standing for one of the Director positions and, as a result, from the position of President. When I accepted both the nomination and the resultant election to the President position last February, 2020, I did so with the intention of fulfilling a much longer term commitment than one year. However, in the last ten months several unforeseen changes occurred within my personal life and Kathy's and my family life that now necessitates I priorize these areas and be more available to each of them. At the same time, with the advent of COVID impacting the church since early March, 2020 and the ongoing increase around due diligence necessary from all board members within their positions, I do believe I cannot do justice to the current requirements of the position.

I invite any church member who would consider the President position to express their interest to myself and/or the members of the Nomination Committee. Your inquiries would be welcomed.

As we move closer to the Annual Congregational Meeting in March and the start of the new church year, I wish you all good health, safe living and a continued sense of community within Olinda.

Clergy Connection

Even as the new year 2021 is still young, January has already proven quite eventful – reminding us that the difficult legacies of 2020 continue to shape our present. The struggle to preserve democratic processes remains vitally important, reminding us that it takes work, and a commitment to truth, to uphold the wellbeing of our communities. Lessons from abroad affect us across borders. The same is true for the need to take advice from health professionals to heart.

Although we are only a couple of weeks in, this month has been difficult in our shared communities, and it is okay to recognize the complicated feelings that can come with these times. Along with anger and sadness, it is also possible to leave space for those things that bring us joy and a sense of hope. And even though the Advent season of expectation is behind us, we can look expectantly toward the possibilities of 2021, including the increased likelihood of in-person gatherings some time into this new year. This is a cautious optimism... and I expect it will still take some time.

One way that we're renewing the spirit of fellowship outside of Sundays includes the revival of our traditional **Soup Meal Fundraiser** – with a virtual twist. This includes full meals, with several soup options, from Toni Janik and Elaine Stevenson (details on page 10). You can **pre-order by Friday, Jan. 15**. The meals will be available on Tuesday, Jan. 17 by contactless pick-up, and you can enjoy them at home. You can eat them any time or join in fellowship by **Zoom on Wednesday, Jan. 20 at 6 pm**. We'll have a few "virtual tables" in Zoom rooms. I'm particularly interested in the dill pickle soup, but there are four options available, so get the ones that appeal to you the most!

I appreciated the thoughtful discussion and small group community-building that I saw in our **Adult RE** program *What Matters Now*, which ran from Nov. 11 to Dec. 9. We explored a number of current topics, delved deeper into the practice of a covenant group, and found spaces for further growth and personal development. The Lifespan Religious Education Committee will explore opportunities for further adult programming, possibly in late winter or spring, and I expect it will offer another space to make sense of our lives and our place in the world.

I was pleased with the generally smooth dynamic at our Budget meeting on Dec. 6, even as we juggled a number of voting options, which was necessary for the sake of inclusion. We also had a momentous meeting on Dec. 20 as we approved our long-awaited revised by-laws. This marks an important step in our incorporation process, and is a witness to many hours of hard work by our volunteers.

February 7 will bring another opportunity to join our Canadian community with a National Service sponsored by the Canadian Unitarian Council, with the theme "*A Faith Worth Failing For*", led by my colleagues, the Revs. Shana Lynngood and Samaya Oakley. We'll work to make this service as accessible as possible to our church members, and I hope to see many of you in that space!

Pandemic Perspectives...Joys & Sorrows

Sadly, a pandemic of global proportions is ravaging not only our country, but the world. It is hard to escape the on-going catastrophe of the pandemic, whether you read the paper, listen to the news or search social media. "Turning it off", literally or figurative-ly, is a challenge.

Many of us have experienced personal losses that are hard to resolve. There are weddings and birthdays, and funerals we have not been able to attend. We often live in fear, and isolation from our friends and family, our support networks. Some of the things that may have given us joy before are no longer available or accessible, due to border closures, loss of jobs, restaurants closed, breakdowns in supply chains, limitations, restrictions, even illness and death. Time for making lemonade out of lemons, so I've tried using my time constructively cleaning out cupboards, gardening, feeding the birds, training the dogs, doing jig saw puzzles, writing snail mail cards to lonely friends, reading, making soup, finding joy in small things, and now trying to figure out Netflix!

We are likely becoming "numb" to all the input. We have looked to our daily routines for some security and sanity, in what seems to be almost daily chaos and insanity. Even though we do our best to "get outside ourselves" and not "circle the wagons", it is sometimes difficult. We try to help who we can, when we can. I do my level best to be a responsible grown-up, wear my mask, wash my hands, stay 6 ft away from everyone, and not gather in groups. We search for answers, from doctors, scientists, and other learned men/women, for our sources of spirituality and faith to guide us, and for a vaccine that will save us all, yesterday.

I have found myself wondering if I will be blessed to survive this, and if so, where will I "fit" in the midst of the "new world" that is wrestling with itself? I miss hugs, smiles, shaking hands, being able to hear some without masks garbling the words. I get angry at selfish people who put their "rights" ahead of their responsibility to **ALL** of us to not spread the virus.



Some days I don't even want to get out of bed, but on others, I bounce out of bed, full of optimism and hope, comforted and joyful, to have been licked awake by one of our Corgis. The simple things in life! Some days I experience reflection and angst, while searching for a positive angle to this forced incarceration.

Property

The committee wishes everyone a hopeful New Year. While the future is ever so uncertain, there are several issues that we'll be considering in the coming months.

As the Pandemic continues, and the Vaccines are now being introduced and distributed to the local community, the possibility of in-person meetings, or even services in our church building must be considered. While the Board of Directors and the Pandemic Task Force update potential procedures, our committee will be charged to investigate building and service upgrades.

One of these, new type filters for the furnaces, has already been introduced by one of our committee members. Richard Stevenson included his report in the last newsletter. The two church furnaces, one for the sanctuary, and one for the remainder of the church are old, and replacement has been discussed for several years. While funds have been budgeted, only motor replacements have been necessary to maintain their functioning.

The potential new filters that will assist with the purification of the building's air, we understand, do not fit our present equipment. Several people and consultants are reviewing this situation, and will shortly present their recommendations

Previous newsletters have introduced the status of the old red brick building north of our church, on the NW corner of the Olinda Sideroad & 5th Concession. It has fallen into disrepair, and has been condemned as unsafe. The property is to be put on the market, for sale in the future.

Word has it that the two adjacent neighbours will be placing offers to effectively enlarge their properties. In the past our church has also been interested, and the Board will be further discussing the potential purchase, and make recommendations to the congregation in an upcoming meeting.

CUC Pastoral Letter from Rev. Anne Barker

January 7, 2021

We write, as Unitarian Universalists, concerned by the frightful political uprising and events occurring in the US this week. Our spirits are with all who are impacted, and we share anger, frustration, and fear around these threats.

Many Canadian Unitarian Universalists have roots in, or close ties to, the US, and many Americans live among us. We appreciate how alarming this must be, to see a rogue militia storm the Capitol building while the Senate meets to confirm the Electoral College vote. To have these events fueled and interfered with by a sitting president is not something we recognize as democracy. And, unfortunately, we are not entirely surprised, given the unchecked rise of extremism, in the US and throughout the world.

Unitarian Universalists are committed to principles of justice and equity, believing in a freedom that comes from honesty, respect, and fair government. We recognize our interdependence and acknowledge that this kind of behaviour could occur anywhere – is occurring in many places – and will require responsible leadership and courageous responses to establish and maintain safe and fair cultures and nations going forward.

As people who are learning about, and bear witness to, the power imbalances within our own country, we recognize the privilege that allowed such an action to take place with so few casualties or arrests. Had the attackers been people of colour or Indigenous, the outcome would likely have been very different.

As people who care about democracy, who respect the hard work and dedication that brought a change in US political representation, we adamantly reject the idea that a defeated government would be held in power by an armed militia of extremists.

These shocking events, and the concerns we hold for the coming days, remind us of our vulnerabilities, and also our responsibilities. The Reverend Susan Frederick-Gray, president of the Unitarian Universalist Association, reassured people in her video on January 6, 2021, that " ... even when we are afraid, we are strong ...", and reinforced that "This is long haul work."

As Unitarian Universalists, we are guided by our connections to purpose, find strength in the dream of beloved community for all, and are determined to be of meaningful service. It is hard to know, in this moment, how we are called to respond – but we are listening, learning, and eager to support a healthy, transformative justice.

United in love, we offer expressions of solidarity, compassion, care, and concern to all and most especially to those who have close ties to the United States. May all that nurtures and sustains you be plentiful in this time. May we be a source of support and strength, in any way possible. May the wisdom and grace of our better natures rise up to meet this occasion – and to whatever follows next. May a better, stronger democracy prevail.

We are in this together. We see you. You are not alone.
