Clergy Connection

Easter will mark one year since we began online services... resurrecting, as it were, our live services (in a new medium) after a three-week pause when we relied exclusively on the written word for shared worship.

Last month was also a time when we honoured Evelyn Fisher at an online memorial service. At that time, I made a point of describing it as an *online* service, rather than a *virtual* one, as we sometimes call services on the videoconferencing medium. The fact is, these are *real* gatherings in which we make real connections. To be sure, the physical element of inperson meetings is hard to replicate online, yet we were also able to join as a community to support each other, as we commemorated and celebrated Evelyn's life. For this memorial service, it also meant that family and friends of Evelyn's could join us from across the border.

The **Lifespan and Religious Education** Committee is looking for your input as we plan more adult programming in the coming months. You can do so by answering a **brief LRE Survey** – there is a paper copy included in this newsletter, and there will also be an electronic option being sent out this month. I participated in an **anti-racism workshop series** by Dr. David Campt, hosted by the Canadian Unitarian Council. This included two Saturday afternoon workshops on **Mar. 6 & 13**. In the coming weeks, the CUC continues to offer online programming, and I recommend taking advantage of similar opportunities as they come up.

One of these opportunities is the **Canadian Unitarian Council National Conference** from **May 14-16**. You can **register by May 9** at a sliding scale from \$5 and up! There will be a number of events and spaces for connection.

Another similar opportunity is for attending the **Parliament of the World's Religions** on **Oct. 17-18**, which this year will be held entirely online. **Early bird registration closes May 31**, at their most accessible rate ever of **US \$50**. I attended the 2018 Parliament when it was held in Toronto, and I'm curious to see where the conversation will go this year!

I look forward to staying connected with you this spring, as we catch the blooming flowers!

"Am I A Racist?"

The quick and easy answer would be a resounding "NO"! As a young gay woman, living in Toronto, who survived raw hatred against my Community in the 60s, 70s and far beyond; survived police beatings, abuse, and humiliation; suffered being called demeaning, hateful, names in public; was not welcome into certain businesses, washrooms, and even churches; could not get jobs, housing, or many other opportunities, strictly because of my sexual orientation, *I know more than a little something about misunderstanding, hatred and discrimination*.

When I first heard of the "Black Lives Matter" Movement, over the past few years, I must admit I was somewhat perplexed. Didn't ALL lives matter? Didn't Hispanic lives matter; Aboriginal lives matter; Women's lives matter, LBGTQ lives matter; Transgender lives matter; Senior lives matter; Disabled lives matter? Didn't MY life matter? So why did "Black" lives matter "more" or differently? Why did they have a "Movement", when other seemingly equally oppressed and misunderstood groups did not? Shouldn't we have protests against the hatred, unjust and/or cruel treatment of ANY group of individuals? *I have a lot to learn.*

The recent news stories about professional sport teams feeling compelled to re-consider their team names and/or logos, had me in a bit of a guandary. The Edmonton Eskimos CFL team, for example. I didn't understand why using the term "Eskimo" was a bad thing. I wish I had opportunity to ask an "Eskimo", who undoubtedly sees it differently. What about the Cleveland Indians? I never perceived the term "Indians" as derogatory. However, clearly their logo, and mascot Chief Wahoo, could certainly be seen as insulting, at the very least. The Washington Redskins, NFL team, had that name for years, without concern or question. "Redskins" did sound suspect to me though. I don't think the term "Redskins" was ever meant as a term of endearment and was never used so in any Western I ever saw. There also began a ground swell of concern about some famous, long-term brands names like "Aunt Jemima" pancake mix and syrup, and "Uncle Ben's" rice, which have drawn criticism, calling their symbols or characterizations as "racist" and demeaning. Are these groups being overly sensitive? I wonder why certain groups perceive such things as "racist" or demeaning when I, as a non-black, non-aboriginal person, White, have just gotten used to seeing these things as "normal" on my table, in my cupboard, or in my life? Do we have to "houseclean" every name or characterization we have today, in case what has been "normal" across the ages is no longer acceptable in a more enlightened world and culture? Probably. I have a lot to learn.

Gone are "the good old days", when it was enough to keep you from being "branded" as a racist, simply by saying: "Some of my best friends are_____" (fill in the blank). Fear of the Unknown is a great divider. I must try harder to be a part of the solution, not part of the problem. I can not allow racism and discrimination to be "invisible". I confess that I do not have all the answers to many of these challenging questions. But I do know that I am eager to expand my horizons, to learn and question, not accept the norm as acceptable and appropriate. I have to remind myself that I too have been on the receiving line of blatant oppression, hatred, misunderstanding, cruel and unjust laws and treatment, and how that felt and shaped me. Change is often painful and slow....but most often worthwhile.

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Property Report

As you may be aware, there was a leak at our Church several weeks ago. Just after the large February snowfall, water leaked into the roof, and down through the second-floor archive vault, and over the Coffee Hour - Tranquility Room areas of the first floor.

We managed to eventually have a local roofer come and inspect the situation. As an experienced building person, I'm aware that locating the source of a roof leak is very difficult. Water that makes its way under shingles, could have started feet or yards (Millimeters or Metres) from where the water drips into the interior.

We have since discussed this with the roofer. He is having a Heating & Cooling Contractor also review the situation, as it is possible that the chimney, which is being used to exhaust gases from our 2 furnaces and is still required, may be the source of the leak. One option was to remove, and replace the old brick chimney, with a new efficient stainless steel unit, that could be better sealed from the elements. A new sleek vent, would however, also not match the character of our old veteran 1880's structure.

At the time ... of going to press ... the investigation is still underway.

Your Property Committee assures all that no work will begin until the best repair is agreed upon by all.

The Leaking, by the way, has stopped, and the tarps are still in place to protect our fine historic church interior, and records.
