
Let us also take some time to send Ray and Laurie Stone all the best of wishes and hope for a timely and successful resolution and recovery.

Clergy Connection

This past month, we had a couple of exciting guest speakers join us, and we'll have another opportunity to hear other voices in the coming month. May is always a busy time for our tradition in Canada. Our church is also exploring how we will offer our traditional fundraiser and community-building aUUction.

And last month, the Newsletter included the paper copy of a **brief LRE Survey** from the **Lifespan and Religious Education** Committee to help us in planning the next steps in Adult RE – I have now sent the electronic option, which is another option for you to offer your input.

You may notice a slight adjustment in the Sunday Service schedule, I shifted one title from April on to May, to accommodate a topic I felt was more pressing. This happens from time to time, as the needs of our community sometimes become apparent after our Newsletter has been printed and sent out.

I've now registered for the **Canadian Unitarian Council's National Conference** from **May 14-16**. You can **register by May 9** at a sliding scale from \$5 and up!

I want to clarify that it is **not necessary to register to attend the National Service** on May 16 – I will simply e-mail out the Zoom and YouTube links the previous Saturday, as usual. I nonetheless encourage you to register for the conference, as it offers a number of events and spaces for connection with Unitarian Universalists across Canada. It also gives us a say in some of the national governance decisions, for which we have assigned two delegates to vote on our behalf.

I will send the registration link to the **Parliament of the World's Religions** later this month. It's set for **Oct. 17-18**, and this year will be held entirely online. **Early bird registration closes May 31**, at their most accessible rate ever of **US\$50**. I attended the 2018 Parliament when it was held in Toronto, and this is an opportunity for more of us to be involved!

Last summer, I came back on duty for a week in August, and also led a service. Accordingly, I will be taking a week of **Study Leave on May 3-9**. I will be offline during that time. The following week, I will be back, with limited availability, while I attend the UU Ministers of Canada (UUMoC) gathering (online), as well as the CUC Conference – I hope to see you at the National Service!

"AGING IN PLACE..."

When I was a young kid, with no perspective on life, my friends and I often made fun of "old people", quietly, of course, out of the earshot of our parents. Then, to a youngster, "old" was probably someone who was thirty. We never imagined that one day we would be "that old". So, fast forward, more than a couple of decades, and I AM "that old" and more, at seventy-one and 3/4s. I often ask myself "how did I get to be this old"? Now, I think anyone who is in their 90s is old! In part, the time went by very slowly, when I was young and carefree, with little responsibility or status. Like most kids, I wasn't content to be 10 or 12, I wanted to be an "adult", when my vision was that I would be able to "do my own thing" and nobody could tell me what to do. If I didn't want to take a bath, I wouldn't have to. If I didn't want to nap, I wouldn't have to! If I didn't want to eat Brussel sprouts, I didn't have to! Then, as I got past a number of "milestones", like 21, 30, 40, 50... time just raced by. Before I realized it, I actually wanted to take a bath, yearned for opportunity to take a nap, and loved having Brussel sprouts on my plate! So now I am at that point when I seem to be looking back a lot more, and not so much forward. Of course I have had some regrets, as most of us have, some things I would like to have done differently, or not at all. I shake my head now that I was so silly and defiant then, that I didn't see that I was headed for trouble any number of times, especially when it came to addictions. I wished that I hadn't "wasted" all that time creating drama and angst in my life, covering the pain of the day, and not taking much responsibility for it. Fortunately, with the help of many supportive people, and a twelve-step program, I have kept my sober head above water for 31 years, as of March 23rd. I was not a very nice person back then, to either myself, my body, or others. When I think back on those times, I know that in the end I did become a better person for it, and it was not so much time "wasted". But I can't help wishing now that I had all those years back, to try and live them differently and with a more creative attitude. My body has reminded me, frequently, of all the punishment I put it through, and now I "pay the price" so to speak, for not being more considerate.

On a positive note, I can look back and appreciate many of the challenges I overcame, be it with education, career, or relationships. Be it late in life or not, I do work at living my life in a different, more settled way. I don't always achieve perfection, but at least I have the tools to help me utilize the wisdom I have accumulated. In this pandemic, I do feel sometimes like I am "Aging in Place", like time is standing still, and I can't participate in the pleasures of life that I wanted to, as we seem to always be in a "lock-down", literally or figuratively. It is more challenging to not lose track of friends and family, as we can't see them, hug them or gather with them. We are isolated from each other and from the many things that make us whole and happy. But we do have hope that the future will be better, if we can all just "hang in there", be kind to one another, and do the right thing, one day at a time!

Aging *can* be amusing, like when I leave my glasses some place, and can't find them, because I need my glasses to see them. Or when I go into a room to get something, and I stop to ask myself "what did I come in here for?" My grandmother always said: "return to the scene of the crime" if you couldn't find where you put something, or why you came into a room. The trouble is remembering, "where do I return *to*?". So yes, I can laugh at my life, and see it for the most interesting journey it has been so far, with all the hills and valleys. In *many ways* I AM blessed.
