#### **Report from the Board**

#### Welcome 2025, a Year of Transition

Christmas season arrives with a couple of significant celestial events. Winter solstice, when the sun remains lowest in the sky and we in the northern hemisphere experience the least sunlight during the day, occurred at 4:21 am ET in the early morning of December 21. Winter solstice was no doubt behind many pagan celebrations at this time of year as people did what they could to encourage the sun to return to its former strength. Our daily sunlight will continue to gradually increase until summer solstice in June. However, it is working against another natural effect. As the Earth circles the sun during our autumn season, it also follows an elliptical orbit and moves further away, reaching its greatest distance from the sun at perihelion around 8:28 am EST on January 4, 2025. But that's a much smaller effect than what's caused by the tilt of the Earth's spin axis.

The 12 days of Christmas run from Christmas Day until Epiphany Eve, January 5. Epiphany is the Day when—according to the Christmas story--the three wise men or kings first see the Christ child, and some children still mark the day by leaving hay, carrots, and water to feed the kings' animals. The practice is encouraged by gifts that would often appear where children had left the food. Today, Epiphany is a traditional time for decorations to be removed from the Christmas tree.

This year, we can celebrate a different sort of epiphany in January as our newly appointed part-time interim minister, Rev. Jim Hatt will be revealed in person to the congregation and give us two Sunday services per month through June. Rev. Jim will give his first two sermons on January 12 and 19 live, but some later sermons will be by Zoom. All are scheduled to start at 10:30 am. He will also help provide pastoral care to his new "flock." In this Newsletter, he has sketched the story of his earlier association with our church and described how he became a minister of the United Church. We will celebrate his appointment with a soup lunch after his service on January 12. All are invited. Welcome Rev. Jim!

Our church lost a long-time core member when Eunice Buhne died peacefully on Winter Solstice this year. A memorial service for her is being planned at UU Olinda at or just after the end of January. It will be led by former minister Rev. Conrad Dippel. Eunice was wife of Emil Buhne and mother to Neil, Kirk, and Cindy. She was head of the Physio Department at Met Hospital and was awarded the Order of Ontario for her leadership and important work in health care. Her son Neil was Regional Director of the UN Development Coordination Office for Asia-Pacific and has given several talks at our church about his experiences, most recently on November 10, 2024.

Our Ministerial Search Committee, under the leadership of Toni Janik, is still actively engaged in looking for a full-time minister to replace our much beloved Reverend Rodrigo Emilio Solano Quesnel, whose life was taken in a traffic accident in July 2023. There are some positive signs in the search but no appointment yet. Stay tuned!

#### Thoughts from Rev. Jim

As I was reading this week, I came across this article by a Unitarian Universalist lady, Michelle Richards, who spoke of having children and how they have dealt with their concern about not celebrating Christmas in a traditional societal way. I wanted to share her thoughts with you and have some discussion in one of my January messages. In my tradition there is so much emphasis on the virgin birth. I have questions about that to this day. So I completely understand the concern.

#### Michelle writes:

"I discovered that many of the rituals of the holiday originate from pagan traditions. Most crucially, at least for us, I unearthed the importance—indeed, the deep need—for many people to have rituals and traditions during this time of year. I thought of our family's ancient ancestors who came from northern Europe, in regions where it might be dark for months at a time. For them, a celebration of the return of the light must have been sustaining.

"For my daughter, who questioned the lack of the tree and Christmas lights in our home, we found ways to celebrate the winter solstice solely by candlelight, a practice that eventually evolved into using no electricity (except for heat—we do, after all, live in northern Indiana). As my son came along and grew into an extension of his electronic devices, it became even more meaningful to have a night without electricity or electronics of any kind.

"We did decide to incorporate gift giving; we also adopted a ritual where each member of the family lights a candle and makes a wish for each of the others. As our children have grown, this ritual has taken on more meaning for our family. Some of us spend a lot of time crafting what we will say in the weeks leading up to the solstice.

"Because our family's holiday is the night of the winter solstice, we didn't put up a Christmas tree. When we visited our children's grandparents' homes, there were traditional Christmas things. The grandparents had special times and built memories with my children they wouldn't have had, had we not changed our mind about the holiday season.

"As Unitarian Universalists, we could talk about the baby Jesus, and the important person he grew up to be. It has provided a way into conversation about how our faith believes that all babies are special and have the potential for greatness. Our extended families still have questions about our faith and beliefs. Over the years, though, we have come to be more accepted by our families—and accepting of traditions that are not our own. We are Unitarian Universalists who found a way to celebrate the winter holidays in ways that fit our family."

And so as Arleen and I celebrate Christmas in our way in Florida we offer our wish... for hope, peace, joy and love for you and your families. That for us is what it is all about!

#### New Year's Message from Rev. Jim

I read an interesting story today as I pondered this new year of 2025. Please let me share it with you.

"Suddenly from behind me a hand appeared and swooped my phone out of my grasp. The hand belonged to a teenager on an electric bike. In seconds, as I began to perceive what had happened, my assailant sped far away from me. I soon saw my predicament: the thief had my whole digital identity, plus my credit cards and driver's license. I pathetically roared my horror and outrage.

"But then two extraordinary things happened. As I uselessly made middle-aged plodding chase, a woman 50 yards away, who'd somehow seen the incident, faced the thief's bike, made herself wide like a star, stood in his way and shouted, "Stop it and drop it!" I was so dazed I scarcely realized what was happening. But when I turned around, a small boy was running toward me with my phone. I received it dumbfounded and dazed, like an audience taking back the ace of spades during a card trick. I thanked the boy, shaking his palm with my still-trembling hand. Only then did I realize that the cyclist had dropped the phone just as the woman had told him to. I looked around to thank her, but she was gone. The whole event took 20 seconds.

"All four characters have wider significance. In the face of a global crisis like COVID, we depend on those who, like the courageous woman, go to strenuous lengths in sometimes daunting and demanding circumstances to give people what they desperately need. Just as vital are those who are like the little boy, who bring the fruits of others' labor to those in need of it.

"Subtly, this 20-second episode for this lady, gives us a picture of this world and how life unfolds serendipitously, how forces like the woman, at great risk saves our life; or like the young boy, gently offers us the incredible gift of restoration; or like the lady of the event, has been willfully robbed of something—human companionship and belonging on the earth—something it feels impossible to live without.

"Her 20-second microdrama showed her life's fragility and apparent randomness, but also life's choice: choice to despoil and destroy or to restore and repair. At such moments we stand in life's way and ponder the many ways we can respond."

As I begin my time as your pastor at Olinda UU church, I hope that we can stop and think what will our choices be. May we all be challenged!

And so as we go into 2025, let us consider our part in Creation and how we will respond: will we despoil and destroy or will we help restore and repair. We are thankful that we are granted the freedom of choice extended to each of us and that it is **our** choice and decision how to respond this coming year.
